

Story Time at Home

- Find a quiet, comfortable place
- Read to your child
- Ask lots of questions and share opinions
- Encourage them to think about new words
- Have fun and laugh!
- Make it a positive experience

Book Talk



You're never too old, too wacky, too wild, to pick up a book and read to a child.





Encourage them to think about new words & talk...

Talk to your child as much as possible and 'feed' them new and ambitious vocabulary.

"Let's eat our lunch now."

"Let's munch our lunch now."

"Let's scoff our lunch now."

"Let's devour our lunch now!"

You're looking ... not just... but...







Vocabulary

Enrich conversations through description:

"Look at that rain. It looks like little diamonds sparkling on the window pane!"

Have fun with words and language.

"I'm as hot as a spud in a cooking pot!"

Praise your child for using new words or interesting phrases









Simple Speed Sounds

Things to remember:







 EVERY book you read is building word recognition, understanding of stories and a love of words, books and reading

- Talking to our children about books and words widens their vocabulary
- Set 1 Sounds pure sounds are crucial
- Key phrases for reading and writing words: 'Fred Talk' & 'Fred Fingers'
- Incidental blending: c − oa − t b − a − g
- Pencil grip: Pinch and Flip
- Book Bag Books & 'Reading for Pleasure' book
- Daily practice: sound sheets and Tapestry updates
