This is a summary of how Pitmaston Primary School delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, extra-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

At Pitmaston Primary School the music curriculum covers the requirements of the National Curriculum and is in line with the model music curriculum and the government's vision to enable all children and young people in England to:

- learn to sing, play an instrument and create music together,
- have the opportunity to progress their musical interests and talents, including professionally.

Our school curriculum for music is bespoke, based around the Charanga English Model Music Curriculum which ensures that children have opportunities to listen to, perform and develop an appreciation for a wide range of music across diverse periods, genres, styles and traditions.

We have enriched this curriculum from the Early Years to Year 6 by offering all our children opportunities not only to play glockenspiel and untuned percussion instruments, but also to learn to play the recorder in Years 3 and 4 and the ukulele in Years 5 and 6. Over the course of study, the children learn more complex melodies and

rhythms that are sung and played. Some pupils who play other instruments bring these to music lessons and play these as part of the pieces all pupils are learning.

To enable easy access to all instruments and resources, school have a purpose built music room where music lessons are taught, individual and paired instrumental lessons taught by peripatetic teachers from Severn Arts and extra-curricular music clubs e.g. choir and orchestra.

All pupils, regardless of Special Educational Needs and Disabilities, access the Pitmaston music curriculum for at least one hour per week through planned whole class music lessons and weekly singing sessions. For a minority of pupils, teachers plan adaptations that may need to be made to support pupils' accessing the curriculum. This may include for example using various instruments, perhaps larger or smaller, specialist equipment for physical or visual impairments, making adaptations to instruments e.g. removing unnecessary keys. Pupils may work in mixed ability pairs with their peers to support their access to the curriculum, or be supported by an adult or use resources to support their learning.

Within the EYFS, both Pre-School and Reception, music is an integral part of children's learning journey. Rhyme and rhythm are utilised throughout the learning of phonics, handwriting and mathematics. Children learn a wide range of songs and rhymes and develop skills for performing together. Singing and music making opportunities are used frequently to embed learning, develop musical awareness and to demonstrate how music can be used to express feelings.

Music lessons are broken down into half-termly units and an emphasis is placed on progressive musical vocabulary outlined in the knowledge ladder, allowing children to talk about pieces of music using the correct terminology.

Each unit of work has an on-going musical learning focus and lessons usually follow a specific learning sequence:

- Listen and Appraise
- Musical Activities (including pulse and rhythm)
- Singing and Voice
- Playing instruments
- Improvisation / Composition
- Perform and Share

The singing curriculum is supported by whole school singing once a week for Reception and Key Stage 1 and a separate Key Stage 2 singing practice. This is a combination of new songs and recapping previously taught ones. This allows the children to sing a wide range of songs as whole songs, rounds and in parts. The choir will often perform in these sessions to the pupils and individuals perform solos.

This year we are continuing to embed class choirs which were developed last year, giving every child the opportunity to perform in assemblies with a focus on performance skills and increased confidence. Songs will be chosen in line with our bespoke progressive singing curriculum. Staff will use the musical knowledge gained from CPD

to continue to lead class choirs and singing assemblies. Staff CPD will also focus on developing composing skills in Music.

Our focus on a 'Musician of the Month' introduces all pupils to a new artist and ensures an appreciation, understanding and love of a diverse range of Music from great composers and musicians. Music is played to pupils from these musicians during music lessons and assemblies to support 'listen and appraise'. These musicians are chosen to celebrate diversity, representing a balance of gender, race, culture and those who have disabilities.

As a school, each class performs an annual class assembly to parents/carers linked to one of their curriculum areas. This performance includes drama, dance, curriculum learning and singing. The songs can include whole class singing, rounds, parts and solos and provides another opportunity to perform for every pupil.

Music and singing is also used across the curriculum to support learning of key facts for example, times tables songs, continent songs in Geography and within topics across the school.

In Year 3 all pupils each year attend the 'Big Sing' at the University of Worcester Arena. Pupils in Year 3 learn a large number of songs to perform at the event and also have the opportunity to sing with a live band and solo artists. Pupils sing in rounds and as a whole and gain the experience of a live concert with hundreds of other pupils from local Worcester schools.

As part of the Severn Arts Music Hub, we are also a Music Mark School.

Part B: Extra-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

The pupils at Pitmaston Primary School have a wide range of choice when choosing an instrument to play outside of lesson time. Within their music lessons pupils learn to play the glockenspiel, recorder and ukulele. School have accessed a grant to enable all 90 pupils in Year 5 to take a ukulele home to enable them to practise in the evenings and at weekends throughout the year.

Lessons are taught by peripatetic teachers provided by Severn Arts Music Service. Lessons are offered as individual, paired or group lessons and there is a cost to these lessons and instruments can be hired or purchased by parents/carers.

In addition, some children have the opportunity to take part in Rock Steady tuition developing instrumental skills and confidence to perform in a rock band context.

Pupils who receive Free School Meals or Pupil Premium can be supported with the cost of learning an instrument. The school will support the cost of one instrument per child.

The school runs a choir as an extra-curricular club weekly for part of the academic year for pupils in Year 5 to Year 6. The choir is led by two specialist music teachers focussing primarily on the Young Voices event and the KS2 Christmas Carol Service which is held in Worcester Cathedral.

The Key Stage 2 school orchestra runs as an extra-curricular club for some pupils who are learning instruments led by the specialist music teachers.

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

At Pitmaston Primary School we see live musical events and experiences as important opportunities to celebrate music and musicianship and therefore ensure all pupils have as many opportunities as possible across their Pitmaston journey.
